SUPPORTING FOSTER TEENS THROUGH PERMANENCY PLANNING:

Meeting Reluctance with Relationship and Clarity

When talking to youth about adoption, using plain language, checking for understanding, and avoiding jargon are foundational to building trust. "The biggest thing I try to talk about is having a conversation on their level," says Jennifer Brooks, MARE Adoption Permanency Specialist. "Also make sure they understand clearly what each thing is that we are asking them to consent to." Brooks recommends using visual tools or videos to help explain recruitment, such as examples of videos of their peers, tangible examples of MARE print materials, or following the video MARE created that discusses recruitment options.

TIPS AND TRICKS FOR A GREAT PLANNING MEETING

Permanency planning meetings are a key part of helping foster youth move toward lasting connections. But for teens with a goal of adoption, especially those who are reluctant, these meetings can feel overwhelming, confusing, or even dismissive of their lived experiences. How professionals approach these conversations makes all the difference. MARE Adoption Permanency Specialists frequently work with reluctant youth and have a wealth of tips to share.

Another common barrier? A youth's initial "no." According to Brooks, "Recruitment is an ongoing conversation." That initial reluctance may reflect fear, grief, or just a lack of understanding. Repeated, respectful conversations—paired with authentic relationship-building—help create space for a shift over time.

MARE Adoption Permanency Specialist Jacqueline Berka agrees. "Acknowledge that it's difficult or even 'weird," she says. Teens deserve honesty about the complexity of adoption.

AN INTERVIEW WITH

Liz, who prefers her nickname over the more formal "Elizabeth," has a heart full of compassion and a mind buzzing with creativity. Liz's heart is firmly grounded in empathy. Enhanced Narratives put more information out there for families.




"Let them know that just because they are open to recruitment doesn't mean they are going to move with a family right away or that they won't have a say in the remaining steps of the process." Berka also emphasizes collaboration with mental health providers, when appropriate. "Communicate with the youth's mental health provider to see if they are working on adoption topics in therapy."

She also suggests framing the conversation in terms of the youth's future. "Ask questions about their hopes for the future and how they feel a family might support them toward those goals," Berka advises, while being careful not to promise specific outcomes or timelines..

Even this newsletter is a recruitment tool. Teens may not even know it! Understanding a teen's natural support system can also open doors. Asking targeted questions like, "Who made you dinner? Where did you go after school? Who were your favorite teachers?" can help uncover meaningful relationships. This can help the team build a family tree or support network and find individuals that could be approached about potential placement/adoption," Berka explains. These conversations can also strengthen rapport and show the youth that their voice and history matter.

Keep in mind that it may take time to get to place where meaningful discussions about adoption and recruitment can happen. "If adoption topics are not going well, focus on building a relationship with the youth and provide support for them in other ways," Berka says. "Visits don't have to be limited to the quarterly visits that are required by policy."

Ultimately, adoption is a deeply emotional topic—often introduced shortly after termination of parental rights. Youth need space, patience, and professionals who will meet them where they are. As Brooks reminds us: "Don't take the first no." Keep showing up, keep listening, and keep the conversation going.
