A guide to 'nesting'

Tips for 'expecting' adoptive and foster parents

Just as expecting birth parents do, adoptive and foster parents should prepare their home for a new arrival. Sometimes called "nesting," it can be one of the most enjoyable preparations in the process of adoption approval or foster care licensing. With a simple search online, you will find plenty of checklists outlining the items required for approval. If your agency hasn't already provided the information, ask for their recommendations.

But nesting isn't just about meeting the requirements, and most prospective foster and adoptive parents look forward to creating a special space for the children and youth who will come to stay. Here are some things to consider when nesting and welcoming a new child into your home. When you prepare a bedroom or areas of your home for a foster child, neutral colors might seem mundane but they can serve a purpose. Choose gray, cream, or other neutral colors for walls, bedding, anything that will be permanently in the room. This will allow any belongings that the child brings with them to fit in, accent the space and make it feel more their own.

Try to add a nook where they can relax, read, write or draw, either in the home somewhere (maybe the family/ TV room) or in their bedroom. This can be as simple as a bean bag chair with a lap table, a few pillows on a mini area rug or a small canopy strung up in a corner. Retailers such as Ikea, Meijer, Walmart, Target, Amazon and others usually have some inexpensive seats and accessories to create this kind of space. Providing a stuffed animal to snuggle can help them feel welcome and safe. You can provide one or let them choose from a few that you keep on hand for kids who are newly placed with you. Keep it simple, though; one is plenty for them to feel welcome; more may just make them feel overwhelmed. Even teens can benefit from having something like this. Include pillows and blankets in the selections for more mature options for older kids.

A sound machine that can play relaxing sounds or soft music, and a nightlight can help them feel safe at bedtime. Also, don't be afraid to make noise at night after a child goes to bed. The sounds of mundane tasks like doing dishes or laundry or a quiet TV can keep



them aware that you are nearby. Letting them know what you will be doing after they go to bed will help them identify noises and minimize fear of new sounds.

Keep in mind that it may take a while for a child to settle in and feel like focusing on any activities you plan, but an opportunity to shop for a few items to personalize their room can be a special treat. That can also be accomplished by inviting them to rearrange their room with your help instead of shopping for new items, and it can be a way to get to know each other a bit more.

Provide some storage for youth to keep the items they bring or may collect during supervised visits. They will want to use them and have access to them. They will need a place to keep them so they are easy to find and easy to protect.

There are many other great tips and ideas for providing space, welcoming youth and helping them get into a routine that will be the foundation of their experience in foster care or transition to adoption.


Shiann also loves singing, dancing and cooking. One of her favorite activities is playing games on her tablet.
