to help you feel welcome in a safe environment."

"Be confident that you can bring unique qualities to a forever family," says MARE Communications Specialist Mark Fisk. "You have plenty of skills and experiences to share that younger youth don't have, and you understand the importance of making family connections."
"Being adopted, even at age 17, means that you will have family to count on for life," says MARE Adoption Navigator Supervisor Kimberly Wolowski. "Family who will be there to celebrate your

birthday and holidays, who will come to your high school and college graduation, who will welcome you home on your college breaks, who will be there when you get married and when you buy your first home and have children. Keep the faith; there can be a family for you!"
